Beekeeping is a tradition of St. Peter's Abbey

St. Peter's Abbey is known for its history of education, farming, gardening and of course, Benedictine monks and priests. A lesser known part of the abbey's past is its apiary which has been a part of the Benedictine monastery for 70 years.

"Honeybees and monasteries seem to have a long and complimentary history," noted Fr. Demetrius Wasylyniuk, OSB, abbey beekeeper. "I corresponded with several monastic beekeepers in North America and in Europe and found that some abbeys have had honeybees for as long as three centuries," he said.


The beginning of honey production at St. Peter's Abbey can be traced to 1946 when Br. Anthony (Tony) Benning, OSB caught a swarm of bees. He acquired a bee box (hive) with a honeycomb frame inside in which bees could store honey. Br. Tony built a honey-house that he used for the extraction of honey and storage of hives and equipment. His successor and brother, Fr. Xavier Benning, OSB taught beekeeping to other Benedictines, including Fr. Demetrius. Other beekeepers who assisted Fr. Xavier were: Brs. Oswald King, John

Brodner and Wolfgang Thiem. Fr. Demetrius assumed the role of beekeeper assistant in 1989 when Br. Wolfgang was assigned the full-time job of helping build the abbey church.

Fr. Xavier was a Benedictine with many talents and one was teaching Latin, Fr. Demetrius remembers. While teaching the art of beekeeping to Fr. Demetrius, Fr. Xavier doubled as a Latin teacher.

"I needed to learn Latin in the seminary and Fr. Xavier, who taught Latin,

A message from Abbot Peter's desk

Dear friends.

I am writing this article from Rome. I am here for the Benedictine Abbots Congress, which meets every four years. This is the seventh congress I've attended since 1992.

Our abbey newsletter focuses on events at our abbey. It recalls some of the major happenings of the past year.

It's not that often that we focus on the wider Benedictine world that our abbey is associated with. For example, there are three Benedictine abbeys in Canada; one in British Columbia, one in Quebec and ours in Saskatchewan.

While each abbey in the world is independent and autonomous, we are also associated with a larger group of abbeys called a congregation. St. Peter's Abbey is a member of the American Cassinese Congregation. We were founded 113 years ago from St. John's Abbey in Minnesota, as well as from St. Vincent Archabbey in Pennsylvania. There are 21 abbeys in our congregation.

There is another congregation in North America, called the Swiss American Congregation. It has 13 abbeys as members, and it includes the Abbey of New Westminster in Mission, B.C. In addition there are about 20 other Benedictine congregations around the world. This all adds up to approximately 7,000 Benedictine men; in addition there are about 14,000 Benedictine women worldwide. We are the oldest monastic community in the world.

While Benedictine abbeys started in

Italy, where St. Benedict was born in 480, monasteries soon spread across Europe. In fact, abbeys were so important in European history that the sixth to twelfth centuries are called the Benedictine Centuries. Abbeys were the centres of learning, of culture, of agriculture, of civilization and of hospitality.

In the 19th century, Benedictines spread to North America, along with the European settlers. Most monasteries established schools and colleges and also did pastoral work. Today, Benedictine abbeys are spreading into Africa and Asia. This is where the new growth is.

Every four years all the abbots world-wide are called to meet as a congress at our Benedictine abbey in Rome, Sant Anselmo. This September about 250 abbots are here. It is a meeting of what is called the Benedictine confederation.

I came a few days earlier, in order to take part in the Canonization Mass for Mother Teresa. It was a sweltering day under the hot sun, but it was a very historic day. She was famous worldwide.

At the two-week congress this year, the main focus of the first week was to elect a new abbot primate, who is considered our head and spokesperson here in Rome. Abbot Notker Wolf has served as abbot primate for 16 years. He oversaw a lot of renovations to our abbey of Sant Anselmo here and traveled to many monasteries worldwide.


After several sessions discussing the role and mission of the new abbot primate, we chose Abbot Gregory Polan of Conception Abbey, Missouri as new abbot primate on Sept. 10. Other areas of discussion included the university of Sant Anselmo and how to improve it; our collaboration with our sister organization, the *Communio* of International Benedictine Sisters (CIB); our outreach to newly established monasteries in Asia and Africa; Aid to International Monasteries (AIM); our on-going interfaith dialogue with Moslem monks; and various work-

shops ranging from our response to climate change to prayerful meditation.

One of the highlights of this year's congress was an audience with Pope Francis on Sept. 8. After a brief address to us in Italian, he shook the hand of everyone present. Some of the most fruitful and rewarding parts of any congress are the friendships renewed and new ones made with monks from other parts of the world. I'm sure it's a dream that St. Benedict never envisioned in his lifetime.

Fr. Rudolph serves many roles as Benedictine

When Fr. Rudolph Novecosky, OSB celebrated his first Mass at his home parish of St. Scholastica, Burr on June 10, 1962 he asked everyone to pray for him as he began his priesthood. The prayers of his family, friends and parishioners have sustained him during the past 54 years in his vocation as a priest and 60 years as a Benedictine monk of St. Peter's Abbey.

Appreciation for his service as a pastor was shown at Fr. Rudolph's 50th anniversary celebration, June 3, 2012, at his former parish of St. Ann's in Annaheim. More than 275 people gathered for Mass and a program. A family gathering was held at St. Peter's Abbey later that day. In the summer of 2016, Fr. Rudolph celebrated 60 years of monastic life at special gatherings in St. Peter's Abbey with the Benedictines and his family.

The importance of a faith life was taken for granted in Fr. Rudolph's family which centered its schedule around prayer and work on a mixed farm near Burr. Fr. Rudolph's parents, Joe and Anne, were active in St. Scholastica Church and the local Burr community. While living in Burr, Fr. Rudolph attended a one-room school, Willow Ridge, up to Grade 9 and then St. Peter's High School from Grades 10 to 12. He took one year of liberal arts at St. Peter's College, Muenster and then

decided to join the Benedictines at St. Peter's Abbey. Fr. Rudolph said he admired the monks and their dedication in their calling to God. He spent the next seven years at St. John's Abbey in Collegeville, Minnesota, where he completed his novitiate and six years of seminary.

Reminiscing about his past it becomes obvious Fr. Rudolph has been very busy. He entered St. Peter's Abbey in 1955, two years before the abbey began a large building campaign. Fr. Rudolph said he learned a lot about construction.

While studying in the seminary he returned to St. Peter's Abbey during the summer where he helped with the abbey's mixed-grain farm and garden. "I did a lot of hoeing back then," he remembers.

Following ordination on June 9, 1962, Fr. Rudolph was appointed assistant pastor with Fr. John Hable of Assumption Parish, Marysburg, and St. Bernard and Holy Trinity at Pilger. He was appointed prefect (supervisor) of St. Peter's High School and college from 1963 until 1972

when the high school closed. Fr. Rudolph worked as a high school teacher, giving instruction in geometry, algebra, trigonometry, Latin, agriculture, geology and appreciation English literature. He did not have a teaching diploma, only the text books to teach both him and the students all the necessary subject material. Having a love for sports, Fr. Rudolph served as sports director at St. Peter's High School where he coached hockey,

volleyball, basketball and track and field. Fr. Rudolph built the track used for track and field meets, the soccer field and the bleachers, east of the arena, in 1967 as part of the centennial project.

Parish work has always been a joy of Fr. Rudolph who, in 1972, began assisting Fr. Werner Renneberg, OSB in the parishes at St. Gregor and Muenster. In 1979, Fr. Rudolph was appointed pastor of St. Gregory Parish in St. Gregor and then St. Ann's Parish at Annaheim beginning August 23, 1987. He served as prior (second in command to the abbot) and sub-prior at St. Peter's Abbey, novice master and work coordinator for the novices and juniors. Between 1987 and 2008 he was the pastor for the two parishes at either Annaheim and St. Gregor, or Annaheim and Naicam, retiring in 2008 to St. Peter's Abbey. Since moving to the abbey Fr. Rudolph has served as prior, novice master/formation director and treasurer of St. Peter's Abbey. He was the Oblate director for one year.

Fr. Rudolph is known by his former parishioners as being supportive of community events. He was often present at community sports events, local celebrations, graduations and homecomings. His support of the community was acknowledged at his 50th anniversary celebration in Annaheim. Fr. Rudolph is known for his expertise in wine making,

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Br. Anthony Nguyen celebrates 25 years of monastic life

"We've all heard the story of how Br. Anthony escaped many years ago from Vietnam. I'm sure he's often said, "Much obliged, Lord." He was especially thankful for the protection of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Abbot Peter said, August 21, in his homily at the 25th anniversary Mass of Br. Anthony Nguyen, OSB. And he will thank her in song during the Preparation of the Gifts and at the end of Mass. It'll be his way of saying "Much obliged, Mary."

Br. Anthony sang, *Ave Maria*, during the Preparation of the Gifts. His relatives sang, *Ave Maria*, in Vietnamese at the conclusion of his anniversary Mass. There was visiting afterwards amongst the Benedictines and 70 guests of Br. Anthony, followed by a festive banquet. Abbot Peter was the homilist at the 25th anniversary Mass, August 28, for Br. Anthony at Holy Family Cathedral in Saskatoon. The celebrant was Fr. Joseph Phong Nguyen.

The history of Br. Anthony reads like a Hollywood script where a person is confronted with tragedy and near death and then rises to triumph over evil. Br. Anthony, 62, was born in Hanoi, Vietnam in 1954 to Joseph Dan Nguyen and Mary So. He was the youngest among his siblings of one brother and two sisters. His only surviving sibling, Theresa Huyen of Mississauga, Ontario was present for his celebration. Br. Anthony's father, Joseph, was a gifted carpenter who rose from poverty to become a successful carpentry instructor and furniture maker. His skills in carpentry were recognized by the royal establishment in Vietnam who employed him to make furniture for the royal family, Br. Anthony said. Joseph became the head of his own construction business which employed some of his former students. The Nguyen family was forced to flee to Saigon in 1954 after the Communists took over North Vietnam. Joseph eventually built a successful carpentry business there. Joseph and his wife Mary both died in Vietnam.

Education and the arts were important to the Nguyen family. Br. Anthony took piano lessons in high school and after graduating Grade 12 in 1973, he studied law for two years at Saigon University. The Communists took over South Vietnam in 1975 and forced Christians to

leave university. Br. Anthony was later employed by the government as a film critic from 1977 to 1980, rating films made by the Vietnamese government.

Life in Vietnam was difficult for Christians who were held under suspicion by the Vietnamese government, Br. Anthony said. Travel was restricted for citizens who were required to have visas to go outside their communities. On July 19, 1980, Br. Anthony decided to leave Vietnam. Br. Anthony hid beneath a net of fish on a boat from 11 p.m. until 6 a.m. when they were out of view of the coast guard.

"We had to stay hidden until it was clear that we were free from surveillance. Afterwards they threw the fish overboard and we were able to sit in the boat and breathe freely. After three days and two nights on the ocean, we met about 70 or 80 pirates. We didn't have anything to eat or to drink," he said. "They took everything we had. Fortunately, they let us live. Rain came and we had some plastic sheets that were used to catch the rain so that we could drink. After the rain, we were able to use the plastic sheets to cover our bodies because the pirates had taken our shirts and all we had to wear was our pants."

The boat landed in Lemngop, Thailand at a refugee camp on July 26, 1980. The

camp was operated by the United Nations. The food supply was inadequate and many refugees went hungry. Water was supplied through a well and the water had to be boiled before it could be consumed. The Canadian embassy, on August 15, 1980, gave Br. Anthony permission to come to Canada. He was very happy because, he said, it was almost like going from purgatory to heaven. He flew to Montreal with nine people on December 8, 1980. Br. Anthony remained in Montreal for four days until the government decided to send him to Saskatoon after learning he had relatives there. Br. Anthony was required to

sign a form promising to reimburse the \$750 airline flights from Thailand to Saskatoon. It did not take him long to repay the travel costs. He found jobs at restaurants where he worked as a waiter and then at a post office where he was a janitor. On November 21, 1984 he became a Canadian citizen.

During late 1980s Br. Anthony discerned about joining a religious order. Saskatoon Bishop James Mahoney suggested he visit St. Peter's Abbey. Br. Anthony arrived there on September 29, 1989, becoming the first Oriental to try religious life at the abbey. He began his vocation working as a janitor, in the gardens, feeding chickens and taking care of the sick. He is presently the church organist, sacristan and looks after the mail room.

"I received grace from God because he helped me get through many difficulties in my life. The way I see things after 25 years makes me realize that many things are possible through God and without God's help I don't think I could have gotten through all the difficulties in my life. My advice to others is to follow Jesus and to put your trust in him. Put your trust in his mercy and pray to him and he will provide you with the guidance to take care of your life," Br. Anthony said.

Fr. Xavier doubles as Latin teacher

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agreed to help. He would often ask me questions or throw a quiz on Latin grammar," Fr. Demetrius remembers. "He was an excellent teacher who taught Latin in St. Peter's High School. And he was a mentor as well," he said. Fr. Xavier enjoyed sharing his knowledge of beekeeping along with his insight into monastic life. He was a gentle person who embraced the wisdom of the Rule of St. Benedict.

The management of the apiary was handed on to Fr. Demetrius in June of 1991 when Fr. Xavier died. Br. Kurt Van Kuren, OSB worked as his assistant for the next nine years. The honeybee colonies had from eight to 10 colonies (hives) which produced up to 900 lbs. of honey in one season. The honeybees gathered pollen and nectar from local flowers, alfalfa and apple blossoms. The honey is used in the monastic kitchen for cooking and baking. It is available in dining rooms for monks and guests.

Fr. Demetrius is the sole beekeeper,

today, and currently manages two colonies of Italian domesticated bees which produce about 280 pounds of honey each season. He enjoys showing

the apiary to visitors and he sometimes gives instruction in honey extraction. One of his students was Jeff Bergermann of Humboldt, great-nephew of Fr. Xavier.

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especially chokecherry and saskatoon wine. His parishioners often supplied him with berries, he said. Many appreciate his wisdom in his book, Homilies for Everyday Life, first published in 2008. The 3rd printing sold out in 2016. Fr. Rudolph is also a stamp collector having taken over Fr. Paul Kuehne's stamp collection after he died.

There are some outdoor enthusiasts who remember Fr. Rudolph's love for berry picking, bird watching, duck hunting and fishing. He often went on fishing trips at Deschambault Lake and Canoe Lake with Frs. Florian, OSB and Werner Renneberg, OSB. Fr. Rudolph suffered a life-changing incident Nov. 3, 1977 when he was injured in the back with a shotgun while hunting ducks. During his convales-

cence Fr. Rudolph experienced the powerful awareness of God's presence. After six and one half months he was well enough to return to the abbey. He went through long periods of pain and depression. Surgery in 1987 relieved him of most of his pain. He is able to walk short distances using crutches and that enabled him to return to parish work a year after leaving the hospital. It is a humbling experience to be dependent on others, he said.

"I began to realize that people who have to help the handicapped are given the opportunity to grow in charity. That realization made it easier for me to be dependent on others," he remarked. Fr. Rudolph believes God has blessed him throughout his years as a priest and is grateful for his vocation. Periodically he still goes out to former parishes to celebrate marriages, funerals and anniversaries.

Centre, Winnipeg, MB. He visited the Trappists at Our Lady of the Prairies in Holland, Manitoba on the way home.

Sept. 2 – Students of St. Peter's College gathered in the college gymnasium where they were welcomed at the beginning of the school year. College Chancellor Abbot Peter Novecosky, OSB and College President Rob Harasymchuk gave a welcoming address. Professor Barbara Langhost gave a slide presentation offering helpful advice on the

upcoming year. Other presentations were given by staff members. A lunch was sponsored by the Benedictines.

Sept. 8 – Some members of the monastic community attended a Year of Consecrated Life gathering at the Cathedral of the Holy Family in Saskatoon. It was sponsored by the Knights of Columbus Denis Mahoney Council. The Year of Consecrated Life was named by Pope Francis on Nov. 30, 2014 and it continued to Feb. 2, 2016. The theme was: "Look at the Past with Gratitude, Live the Present with Passion and Embrace the Future with Hope".

Sept. 13-18 – Abbot Peter attended the annual plenary meeting of the Canadian bishops in Cornwall, Ontario.

Sept. 19-22 – Abbot Peter attended a Canadian Religious Conference Council and regional meeting in Halifax.

Sept. 25 - 28 - Abbot Peter and Kathy Tumback, abbey business manager, attended the annual ATRI conference in Saskatoon for religious superiors and financial staff. Sept. 26 – Sixty-five students received awards worth \$70,000 at the annual St. Peter's College Scholarships and Awards Ceremony. Seven writing diplomas were awarded, as well as 20 honour roll certificates. Approximately 130 attended the event in the college gymnasium.

Oct. 1 - Abbot Peter and Br. Basil Schaan, OSB attended the unveiling of an historical monument in Wascana Centre, Regina. Some members of the Ursulines and Elizabethans of Saskatoon and formerly of Humboldt, were in attendance. More than 180 Sisters from across Canada attended the unveiling. The bronze monument, entitled Called to Serve, depicts a nun teaching a student as well as a nun taking care of the sick. It was sponsored by the Sisters Legacy Recognition Project to pay tribute to the first teachers and nurses in the province. The monument is southeast of the Legislative Building and overlooks Wascana Lake. A Sisters Legacy Recognition Mass was held at Holy Rosary Cathedral. Archbishop Luigi Bonazzi, Apostolic Nuncio to Canada, was the presiding celebrant. The Gray Nuns were the first religious in the province, arriving in 1860 to provide health care.

Oct. 2 – Fr. Paul Paproski, OSB presented a PowerPoint to students and staff on the history of St. Peter's College. The presentation, attended by 35, was on behalf of campus ministry. Among those in attendance were Fr. Demetrius Wasylyniuk, OSB and Br. Pierre Rouillard, OSB of St. Peter's College Campus Ministry.

Oct. 3 – Abbot Peter attended a Celebration of the Eucharist at Holy Family Cathedral with Archbishop Luigi Bonazzi, Apostolic Nuncio to Canada. Other bishops concelebrating were: Donald Bolen, Diocese of Saskatoon; Bryan Bayda, CSsR, Eparchy of Saskatoon; Gary Gordon, Victoria, B.C.; and Gerald Wiesner, OMI (emeritus).

Oct. 6-9 – Eighteen members of the Anglican clergy with the Diocese of Saskatoon held their annual retreat at the abbey. The Anglican Diocese of Saskatoon has been holding its annual retreat at the

Barbara Saretsky of Humboldt and Jackie Saretsky of Saskatoon made their Final Oblations. Pol and Judy Zwart explained the prayer book, "Give Us This Day" to 35 attending the afternoon session. Craig Larson of Swan River, Manitoba gave a presentation on his visit to four Houses of Prayer. They are based on the model of the Catholic Worker Movement that was inaugurated by Dorothy Day.

Oct. 30 – Fr. Demetrius gave a presentation to 35 students at a noon hour luncheon on All Hallows Eve and Halloween. He explained the meaning of All Hallows Eve and the origins of Halloween. The presentation was sponsored by campus ministry.

Oct. 31 – The grass was green and wet for youngsters as they celebrated Halloween.

Nov. 3 – Abbot Peter took part in the annual meeting of Saskatchewan bishops and religious leaders in Saskatoon.

Nov. 5 – The first snowfall came, just enough to cover the ground. Bernie and Shirley Karstad left the abbey for Saskatoon to move into their new home. They had been living on the abbey grounds for five months while their condo was being built.

Nov. 13-15 – Fr. Paul was a facilitator at the Engaged Encounter (EE) held at St. Michael's Retreat Centre, Lumsden for the Archdiocese of Regina. Thirteen couples attended the weekend event. The EE was the final to be held at St. Michael's.

Nov. 18 – The monks woke up to blowing snow. Two centimeters blanketed the ground to become the first permanent snowfall for the fall season.

Nov. 20 - Abbot Peter attended the

chapel blessing and dedication at Trinity Manor in Saskatoon. Bishop Donald Bolen presided at Mass. Following was the dedication of stained-glass panels at Trinity Manor and Samaritan Place honoring the memories of Urban Donlevy and Rod Donlevy.

Nov. 22 – Fr. Paul Paproski, OSB and Fr. Daniel Muyres, OSB attended a celebration at St. Peter's Parish, Muenster commemorating the end of renovations and the installation of 28 stained-glass windows. The parish began renovations in 2008 to prepare for the centennial of the parish building in 2010. The renovations were completed in October.

OSB was a facilitator at an Engagement Encounter near Moose Jaw for the Archdiocese of Regina.





Fr. Joseph Ackerman retires as full-time pastor

Fr. Joseph Ackerman, OSB is known for his sense of humour and gentle disposition. He enjoys brightening the atmosphere at Mass and social gatherings with light-hearted jokes. Fr. Joseph loves to share his wisdom and insight, as well, in his homilies and stories which he nourishes through his study of scripture and spiritual reading.

A new milestone was reached by Fr. Joseph in August of 2016 when he retired at the age of 91. He had been serving the parishes of St. Bruno in Bruno and St. Agnes, Peterson and decided to remain in the rectory at Bruno to continue as the assistant to his replacement, Fr. Cosmas Epifano, OSB.

The love of serving as a priest has enabled Fr. Joseph to work in parishes for almost 60 years. He was ordained to the priesthood on June 8, 1958. The parishes of St. Bruno and St. Agnes recognized Fr. Joseph in 2008 for his 50 years of priesthood. A jubilee celebration was held at the abbey as well. Fr. Joseph has been a monk of St. Peter's Abbey for almost 65 years, receiving his profession in June of 1952.

Baptized Peter, Fr. Joe was born in the village of Balgonie on Sept. 20, 1924, to Andrew and Emilia Ackerman. He was among 15 children in this family. His father was employed by the Canadian Pacific Railroad Co., which necessitated moving to various locations. The family was poor, remembers Fr. Joseph, but his parents kept everyone happy and united. He received his early education in Wolseley, Estevan and Regina. After a brief period of employment, Fr. Joseph enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force, serving oversees in the Second World War from 1943-45.

A new direction was taken by Fr. Joseph (Peter) from 1947-51 when he attended St. Peter's College and then entered the Order of St. Benedict where

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he received his present name "Joseph". He completed a year novitiate at St. Peter's Abbey and then continued his seminary studies at St. John's Abbey, Collegeville, Minn. Fr. Joseph ordained to the priesthood in St. Peter's Cathedral, Muenster by the late Bishop Francis Klein. Following ordination Fr. Joseph taught at St. Peter's High School, assisted in various parishes, served as assistant business manager at St. Peter's Abbey and became pastor of the Muen-

ster and St. Gregory parishes.

In 1970, Fr. Joseph went on a sabbatical where he studied at the Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C., and then at Duke University, Durham, N.C. On his return he was appointed pastor of St. Anthony and St. James parishes, Lake Lenore. His next
