

Abbot Jerome's activities

I attended a seminar on Humanae Vitae, its liberating implications. It was held in Saskatoon, May 1-2. Five married couples spoke very convincingly about their commitment to follow the principles given by Pope Paul VI in his instruction on human life.

On May 15 Deacon Murray Chatlain was ordained to the priesthood in Holy Spirit Church in Saskatoon by Bishop James Mahoney. Murray was at St. Peter's several times for a retreat, and so I was happy to be able to concelebrate at the mass of ordination.

On June 1-2 the provincial CWL held its annual convention in the Uniplex in Humboldt, since it was the turn of the abbacy to host the convention. I attended the banquet on June 1, and celebrated the closing Mass the next day.

The Canadian Catholic Organization for Development and Peace (CCODP) held its annual meeting this year in Saskatoon. As part of the program the members present made a pilgrimage to the shrine of Mary at St. Laurent on June 13. I joined them there to celebrate the Mass at the shrine. Later in the evening all of us travelled to the farm of Ken DeMong, near Cudworth, and enjoyed a delicious outdoor supper.

From June 14-21 I was at the Precious Blood Monastery in Regina for a directed retreat for some of the sisters. I had to interrupt the retreat for a time to be able to be present at the funeral of Fr. Augustine. (Some of the Sisters came to St. Peter's on July 27 for an outing and a visit.)

Parishes honor Father Rudolph

On Sunday, June 14, the parish of St. Scholastica, Burr, honored Father Rudolph Novecosky, a native son. Another celebration was held by the parish of St. Gregory, St. Gregor, the parish he is presently serving as pastor, the previous Sunday. Father Rudolph is celebrating the 25th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood.

Father Rudolph was born and raised in Burr. His final years of high school and first year university were taken at St. Peter's College.

In 1955, Father Rudolph joined the community and took his novitiate year, philosophy and theology studies at St. John's University, Collegeville, Minn.

Father Rudolph was ordained by Bishop Francis Klein at St. Peter's Cathedral, Muenster, June 9, 1962. Immediately after he joined the staff of St. Peter's College, as teacher, prefect and sports director. In 1972, when the


college dropped its high school, Father Rudolph increased his pastoral duties. He became assistant to Father Werner Renneberg who was pastor of Muenster and St. Gregor. In 1976 he became pastor of St. Gregor.

It was during these years that he also served as subprior, then prior of the abbey, as well as novice master and work co-ordinator for the novices and juniors.

His pastoral duties were interrupted in November, 1977, when a hunting accident resulted in a severed spine with the resulting loss of feeling from the waist down. After months of recuperating and aided with crutches and wheelchair, his mobility resumed. On March 4 of 1987 further surgery on the sensory nerves has relieved almost all the pain he has been enduring since 1977.

Father Rudolph has, over the past few years, spent countless hours working on the abbey stamp collection. In recent years he has resumed the fishing trips which he enjoyed so much before the accident.

This fall Father Rudolph will become resident pastor of St. Ann's Parish, Annaheim.

Monks make temporary vows

Two monks completed their year of novitiate and professed three-year temporary vows during the eucharistic celebration on the feast of St. Benedict. July 11. The celebration took place at St. Peter's Cathedral, Muenster.

Brother Thomas David Ward was born in Birmingham, England, where he received his early education. After spending six months with the Dominicans, he joined the family firm of Manufacturing Jewellers, W. J. Sutton Ltd., and remained with them almost a year.

In 1967 Brother Thomas entered the British army as a chef. During his nine years with the army he travelled to places like Hong Kong, West Indies, Northern Ireland and Belize.

While in the army he got married. After leaving the army and separating from his wife he went to work on the oil rigs in the North Sea as chef in a hotel in Cumbria, England, for one vear.

Brother Thomas left England in January, 1981, and went back to Belize. He worked as a chef in a hotel until he entered the Benedictines in Belize, after getting a marriage annulment. He was sent to New Subiaco Abbey, Arkansas for novitiate. He discontinued the religious life after six months.

Since then Brother Thomas has worked mainly in Northern Canada as chef and then manager of a cafe in Churchill

Brother Thomas looks after the abbey pig operation and is infirmarian at the abbey. He plans to take some university classes this fall. He lists his interests as scouting, camping and hiking.

Brother Richard Edward Meidl was born in Cudworth, but lived in Dauphin, Manitoba, since he was six years old. manager for two years, then head chef After receiving his BA and B.Ed. in for six years in various Manitoba schools.

For the 11 years prior to entering St. Peter's, Brother Richard worked as office manager/accountant in Dauphin, then Portage la Prairie and Regina.

Among his many jobs around the abbey, Brother Richard spends a day per week doing bookkeeping at the press.

Brother Richard had been very involved with the Archdiocese Lay Ministry Formation Program, the Knights of Columbus and Manitoba Pro-Life. He lists his interests as crafts, photography, geneology and local and Canadian history.

Brother Richard plans to attend the College Graduate (Pre-Theology) program at St. Meinrad's Seminary, St. Meinrad, Indiana, in the fall.


Father Lawrence DeMong spent a few days in Edmonton, May 7-9 offering his expertise in the field of religious education.

On May 11, Father Albert Ruetz returned home ahead of schedule. Ill health forced him to cancel his plans to tour Greece and parts of Europe.


Brother Basil Schaan returned home May 11 from Mount Angel Abbey, St. Benedict, Oregon. He will return in August to continue his studies in theology there.

Father Augustine Nenzel dies

On June 15, Father Augustine Nenzil passed away in St. Elizabeth Hospital, Humboldt. He had been confined to hospital since February when it was discovered he had cancer of the pancreas.

Father Augustine (Albert) Nenzel was born in Nenzel, Nebraska, on December 19, 1901, and came to Muenster with his parents on March 21, 1903. He began his elementary education at Muenster, continued it at the

mission school at Cranbrook, B.C., where his father was ranch foreman, and completed it at St. Louis College of the O.M.I. Fathers at New Westminster, B.C., in 1917.

He returned to Muenster with his family in June 1917, and in the fall of 1921 he became a day student in the newly opened St. Peter's College, continuing to work on his father's farm.

He entered the novitiate of St. Peter's Abbey in 1925, made his vows on July 17, 1926, and was ordained at Muenster on June 29, 1932, by Bishop Joseph Prudhomme of Prince Albert and Saskatoon.

Father Augustine resided at St. Peter's Abbey for 30 years after his ordination, teaching at St. Peter's College, and assisting on weekends and at festival times in the parishes of St. Peter's Abbacy.

Alumni of St. Peter's College remember him especially as student prefect for 8 years, student chaplain for 11 years, and director of dramatics for 20 years.

From 1955 to 1962 he was editor of the Prairie Messenger and weekend chaplain at St. Ursula's Academy and Convent, Bruno.

After 1962 he was assistant pastor and chaplain at Bruno and Humboldt, and pastor at Carmel (1964 - 1967), Bruno (1969 - 1970), St. Benedict (1970 - 1978), and Middle Lake with Bethany Village of senior citizens (1972 - 1978).

From 1978 to his retirement at St. Peter's Abbey in 1984 he was chaplain of St. Elizabeth's Hospital and Saint Mary's Villa, Humboldt, beloved by all for his friendly availability and humor.

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Monks make solemn profession

Brothers Michael McAllister, Basil Schaan and Kurt Van Kuren made their solemn profession of vows as Benedictine monks on July 11. The ceremony was held at St. Peter's Cathedral, Muenster.

Brother Michael Joseph McAllister was born in Toronto but lived all his life in Oshawa. He has always been involved in charitable works, ministering as lay pastoral hospital visitor and doing prison ministry under Cursillo for seven years.

Brother Michael has inherited some of the cleaning jobs formerly done by Brother John Brodner. He is also responsible for keeping our fleet of cars clean. Brother Michael is also involved in the abbey candlemaking craft and helps print the Prairie Messenger.

Brother Michael is a self-taught ventriloquist and lists writing poetry as another of his interests.

Brother Basil Schaan was born and raised in Young, Sask. He began working part time at the Young Credit Union in 1968. At this time he was completing correspondence courses in basic studies in credit and in airline traffic control. In 1970 he started working full time with the Young Credit Union and the small town credit unions in Loreburn and Denzil.

Since 1976 Brother Basil has been involved with social justice activities such as CCODP, SCIC, CDF and other church-related organizations.

This past year Brother Basil has been attending pre-theology classes at Mount Angel Abbey, St. Benedict, Oregon. He will be returning in August to continue the program.

Brother Basil enjoys manual labor and has worked as work co-ordinator for the junior monks. This summer he volunteered to assist at St. John Bosco Camp as counsellor for 10 days.

Oblate news

Oblates of St. Benedict are Christians who have associated themselves with a Benedictine community in order to enrich their Christian way of life.

St. Paul tells us that each member of the body of Christ, the church, has a special function to perform. Most are called to the married state and the raising of a family. Some are called to the single state in the world and others to the life of a priest or religious man or woman.

The role of Oblates is to live in the world, to become holy in the world, to do what they can to bring the world to God by being witnesses of Christ by word and example to those around them. — AR
