Summary of Abbot Jerome's activities

February 20 saw me at the Grey Nuns Centre in Edmonton for the annual meeting of the Roman Catholic Bishops of Western Canada — about 25 in all. Father Morrissey, OMI of Ottawa spoke to us. about the new Canon Law which becomes effective on November 27, 1983, the first Sunday of Advent. I could not stay for the whole session because I had to return early for the funeral of Father Paul

A meeting of the Roman Catholic Bishops of Saskatchewan took me to Saskatoon on April 18. Next day we met with the three Anglican Bishops of the province to discuss matters of common interest.

The annual convention of the K. of C. of Saskatchewan was in Saskatoon on April 30. I concelebrated Holy Mass with Bishop Mahoney in St. Paul's Cathedral in the morning. In the evening there was a banquet at the Centennial auditorium.

The Provincial CWL had their annual convention in Regina. It began with a Mass at Holy Rosary Cathedral on May 29 during which

the hierarchy of our province dedicated the Catholics of Saskatchewan to Mary.

I was pleased to celebrate with Bishop Delaquis of Gravelbourg his 25th anniversary of ordination to the priesthood. This took place in Swift Current on June 1. We remember him gratefully at St. Peter's as our retreat director in 1982.

On June 10, I drove to Prince Albert to join the people of that diocese in welcoming their new Bishop, Blaise Morand, during a Mass in Sacred Heart Cathedral. Before this there was a banquet in which there was an appreciation to Bishop Morin, the former Bishop, who had served there for 24 years.

The triennial Chapter of the American Cassinese Federation (18 Abbeys and 4 priories) to which St. Peter's belongs, was held at Assumption Abbey, Richardton, North Dakota, June 13 - 18. Father Andrew, as the delegate chosen for St. Peter's, and I, drove there by car.

Abbot Jerome visits Brazil in August, 1982


During two weeks of August, 1982, I again visited our team in Maceio, Brazil. Father Bernard Stauber, who had been at St. Peter's for two years, was returning to resume his apostolate in Brazil. We traveled together by air via Saskatoon, Toronto, New York, Rio and then landed at Maceio airport where we were greeted by the team, Father Sylvester and Sisters Maria Doepker, OSU, Claire Novecosky, OSU, and Dolores Jansen, OSE.

There would be very many things I could report, but I'll have to restrict myself to a few.

The gratitude and appreciation for the presence of the team and their contribution to the people was expressed again and again as I visited the 5 parishes and communities in which they work on the occasion of the Sunday Mass or other special festivity.

The Archbishop, Dom Miguel, did the same, publicly during a Mass in his cathedral during a special celebration, and privately at a farewell at his home on the evening before I returned to Canada.

One of the real highlights was my visit to the farm a couple hours drive from Maceio. This farm is the property of the Archdiocese and its care and development was entrusted to Father Sylvester about 3 years ago. There are about 120 families living on 1400 acres, so each family can farm very few acres. I got to the new school, where the Mass was to be, on horseback (for about a mile) since it was the rainy season and cars could not get that close. The last lap included crossing a small river in a tiny boat out of which the water had first to be dipped.

There is a community centre and a school in one building, and its presence is mainly due to the initiative of Father Sylvester, as is the presence of electricity. He was also beginning to build a cistern for storage of water for the school, which is necessary during the dry season, and was planning a manioc factory to make a sort of flour, since the manioc can be grown right there. Both have now been completed.

Father Sylvester has organized the people in such a way that they are pretty well in charge of the changes on the farm, but he is often consulted on many different items.

I had supper at one of the nearby homes, and slept at the school in one of the classrooms that evening. Next day Fathers Sylvester and Bernard and Antonio and I — all on horseback — rode around the farm looking at the crops, the corn, potatoes, rice and various fruit trees, oranges, lemons, bananas, avocada, and coconuts, the vegetable gardens (lettuce, sweet potatoes, squash, and others native to Brazil). There is a tractor now to help, but almost all the work on the fields is done by hand.

A third event was the dinner just outside the church of Sao Jose on a Sunday afternoon, organized and carried out by the parishioners themselves, and done very well, with abundant food of various kinds, and music too. This could not really have happened 15 years ago, and it is a tribute both to the team who have taught the people to make use of their talents and ability, and to the people who are so willing to learn and work together.

A ten minute walk from the parish house would bring me to the Atlantic Ocean. Several times I went there to see the vast expanse of water, the restless waves rolling in on the shore, to watch the many young boys playing soccer on the sandy beach (that's no doubt why Brazil soccer teams are always among the best in the world), to feel the cool salty breeze blow inland. That's why the beaches are so well patronized, since it takes the people away from the usual heat of the city.

Complete dairy herd sold

The complete dairy herd, consisting of 60 registered and grade holsteins, of St. Peter's College Farm was sold at a complete dairy dispersal auction sale on Monday, June 13. The sale was held at the Livestock Pavilion Sales barn, Saskatoon Exhibition Grounds. Ed Roth's Auction Service of Rosthern conducted the sale.

The Holstein Dairy Herd at St. Peter's College Farm was started in the early 1940s. The first pedigreed cows were purchased at the dairy dispersal of the Orphanage at Prince

Albert and transported to Humboldt by rail.

As years progressed more pedigreed animals were raised and purchased. The herd was put on R.O.P. in the 1950s and has been on R.O.P. ever since. A. I. Sires were used on the herd since 1968. The herd has been on Herd Health under veterinarian supervision since 1970.

The dairy herd was sold with reluctance. The resignation of the herdsman and the inability to obtain an experienced replacement made it impossible to continue with the herd.

Monks observe jubilees

On July 11, the feast of St. Benedict, our community honored three jubilarians: Brother John Brodner (50th anniversary of religious profession, July 3, 1933); Father Joseph Ackerman (25th anniversary of ordination to the priesthood, June 8, 1958); Father Sylvester Vredegoor (25th anniversary of religious profession, July 11, 1958).

Brother John Brodner

Brother John Brodner is one of five members of the same family (four brothers and a sister) gifted to St. Peter's Abbey and Abbacy by St. Henry's Parish of Kronsberg (Dysart), in the Archdiocese of Regina.

Born in Dysart, John Brodner learned about St. Peter's abbey from his two younger brothers George (Father George) and Martin (Father Martin), who came to St. Peter's College in 1929 to begin their high school education.

He came to St. Peter's for the first time to witness the monastic investiture of his older

brother Frank (Brother Gregory).

A year later (1932) he entered the novitiate, after the completion of which he made his first profession of monastic vows on July 3, 1933.

During the first few years after his religious profession, Brother John worked on the College farm, sharing fully in the fall harvesting and winter woodcutting.

Very soon he became heating engineer, a position which involved long day hours, frequent night watches, and an occasional venture

into a still heated boiler for repairs.

Then for a number of years he was horticulturist, responsible for the planting, cultivating, and transplanting of thousands of young evergreens, and the development of a large crab-apple orchard.

He was also beekeeper, until a gradually developed allergy made it necessary to entrust the care of the busy insects to less sensitive

hands

While still at his home, in a family of 15 children, Brother John had learned the art of barbering, and ever since his arrival at St. Peter's he has been our obliging and genial barber.

Since the building of the students' residence (Severin Hall) and the Abbey residence, one of his many services to the community has been that of maintenance. This cost him some broken ribs and nearly his life several years ago, when a tall window-washing scaffold upset.

As driver and chauffeur Brother John has given up countless half-days and entire days to run errands for abbey, school, farm, and press, and to take confreres to Humboldt or Saskatoon for appointments with the dentist or doctor, or to the parishes for ministry.

For many years he was guest-master, making all feel at home with his helpful friendliness, accompanied by the Brodner

smile.

On August 1, Brother John's Golden Jubilee will be celebrated at Dysart with a festive Mass, a parish dinner, and a family reunion.

The members of St. Peter's Abbey and the staff of St. Peter's College offer him their congratulations and sincerest thanks.

Father Joseph Ackerman

When Peter Ackerman came to St. Peter's College in September of 1947, memories were still fresh of the first attempt at a Gilbert and Sullivan operetta. Within a few days the new student from Regina was identified as G & S's Military Man — by his bearing, his precision in speech and action, and his thumb-rule: "This is the way we did it in the airforce."

Peter Ackerman was born in Balgonie, Saskatchewan, and received his elementary education there and in Regina. In 1943 he enlisted in the RCAF, taking his ground-crew training at Brandon, Manitoba. He went overseas in 1945 and was stationed in northwest

London.

After the war he came to St. Peter's College to complete his high school and first year university, with the thought of preparing for the priesthood. He entered the community of St.

Peter's Abbey as a novice in 1951 and made his first profession of religious vows on June 17, 1952.

Father Joseph completed his monastic formation and his university and seminary studies at St. John's Abbey, Collegeville, Minnesota. He was ordained to the priesthood at Muenster on June 8, 1958, by Bishop Francis Klein.

After teaching for three years at St. Peter's and helping in the business office, he became the assistant priest at St. Augustine's parish, Humboldt, where he was eminently successful

in guiding Catholic Youth activities.

He was pastor of St. Peter's cathedral parish at Muenster from 1966 to 1970. Then he was given a year's leave for studies at Catholic University, Washington, D.C., and Duke University, Durham, N.C. Since August, 1971 he has been Pastor of St. Anthony's parish, Lake Lenore, and of the rural parish of St. James.

Father Joseph is an active member of the Canadian Legion, and appears without fail in the Humboldt Journal picture of the Legionnaires on Remembrance Day, standing at attention while the wreath is laid before the cenotaph — still every inch the Military Man.

Father Sylvester Vredegoor

Born in Holland, Anthony Vredegoor came to Canada in 1952 and immediately enrolled as a student at St. Peter's College to complete his

high school.

He entered the Benedictine community of St. Peter's Abbey as a novice in 1957 and made his first profession of religious vows on July 11, 1958. After completing his seminary studies at St. John's Abbey, Collegeville, Minnesota, he was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop Francis Klein of Saskatoon on June 6, 1964.

Since 1967 Father Sylvester has been on the St. Peter's Abbacy mission team in the city of

Maceio, province of Alagoas, Brazil.

When he returned this year on his triennial leave, he was accompanied by Rosilda de Amorim Lima, of the parish of San Jose, Maceio, who came to thank the people of St. Peter's Abbacy for their support of the missionary team and for the contributions which

have made possible the construction or repair of six churches and the launching of many community projects within the immense and predominantly poor parish.

At the annual Mount Carmel pilgrimage, July 17, Abbot Jerome gave Father Sylvester and Rosilda an opportunity to express their

thanks to the people of the Abbacy.

Throughout the sixteen years of his work in Brazil, Father Sylvester has attempted to combine the spiritual and the temporal (specifically social improvement) both in his ministry and in the lives of his parishioners.

The following paragraph comes near the end of a report by Eileen Saunders in the July

31, 1983, Prairie Messenger:

"It is this work, with the local people, that forms the basis of the mission's work in Maceio. Father Sylvester said that since he and Alvin Hergott founded the mission team there, in January, 1967, the emphasis has been on trying to develop a stronger sense of community in every part of the parish. And this year, he said, about 50 lay visitators are being trained. They hope to go out to all the homes that have never been visited. 'We hope to at least double the number of people who are fully with the church over the next year or so.' "

Our congratulations and sincerest thanks to Father Sylvester.

The Saskatchewan Writers Guild finds St. Peter's very conducive to writing books, poetry and painting. About a dozen spent two weeks here in July, 1982 while half a dozen spent three weeks here in July, 1983. They expect to be back again next July for three weeks.




Two groups booked for April were both large: the boy scouts and a Lutheran youth group from Yorkton.

Returns from studies



Father Paul Kuehne dies

Father Paul (Erwin) Kuehne passed away February 20 in his chaplain's quarters at St. Mary's Villa in Humboldt.

Father Paul was born in Berlin, Germany, on October 5, 1897. He came to the United States at the age of sixteen.

After completing his secondary education at St. John's, Collegeville, Minnesota, he was one of a group of six students who answered the urgent appeal of Abbot Michael Ott, OSB, for teachers and priests in the newly opened St. Peter's College (1921) and the recently erected (1919) St. Peter's Abbacy. He made his first vows as a member of St. Peter's Abbey on July 16, 1922, and was ordained to the priesthood on August 2, 1925, by Archbishop Dowling, of St. Paul, Minnesota.

From 1922 to 1948 he taught a heavy schedule of classes at St. Peter's College, with only several summers off for specialization in mathematics, botany, and biology. During these summers he obtained a BA degree from St. John's University, Collegeville, Minnesota (1934), and a M. Sc. degree from the University of Minnesota (1937), with specialization in phycology and biometry.

During all his years at St. Peter's College he taught violin and played violin in the College orchestra, of which he was also codirector.

From 1948 to 1952 he was chaplain and nurses' instructor at St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Humboldt. He was pastor at Annaheim from 1952 to 1966, during which time the new St. Ann's church was built. From 1966 to 1970 he was pastor of St. George's Church, Naicam. From 1970 to the time of his death he was chaplain at St. Mary's Villa, Humboldt.

In recent years Father Paul was afflicted with diabetes, for which he was hospitalized several times.
