A prayer-filled, happy season

The season of Advent is introduced with special proper antiphons and hymns at our Vespers and Morning Praise. Our whole monastic prayer captures the themes of the season. The novices made an advent wreath for the monastic dining room.

As we drew closer to Christmas, beginning December 17, our evening Vespers included the beautiful "O" antiphons. This year Abbot Jerome helped deepen our appreciation of the antiphons by giving a brief reflection on each O antiphon before Vespers. Frequent choir practices these days also helped preview the themes of the season on our minds and in our hearts.

December 24 saw the junior monks busily putting up Christmas trees and decorations. Home-grown trees were brought in for the main entrance, dining room and recreation room. This latter was decorated by the entire community following the evening meal.

An original creche was added to the chapel in time for Evening Praise on Christmas Eve. Over the past few years, it has been the creation of the novices. This year it was inspired by the Huron Christmas Carol.

Following Evening Praise the junior monks welcomed the Christmas season by making a tour to the residences on our property to sing Christmas carols. This was done prior to Midnight Mass. Midnight Mass captured the solemnity of Christ's birth with joyful song and praise. Some students and their families as well as close friends of the abbey joined us in our abbey chapel for the celebration. Lunch was available following the mass, a joyous extension of the good will and friendship just celebrated.

After the noon meal on Christmas day, the community gathered in the recreation room for the opening of gifts. Father Abbot expressed gratitude in the name of the entire community for the many acts of kindness shown the community. The evening meal on Christmas day was the most festive meal and saw the return of many of our monks who have pastoral responsibilities. (The lay staff and sisters make all the meals during the Christmas season festive and special.)

The day following Christmas, we welcomed the families of our community members for an afternoon of skating, cards and visiting.

On December 27, our Sisters of St. Elizabeth invited us all to drop over for a come-andgo tea at their convent.

This Christmas spirit prevailed in our prayer, work and relaxation to the feast of the Baptism of Christ. The trees were taken down, the decorations were put away, the creches (in our chapel and outdoors) were retired for another year, but the spirit of Christmas, of the Word made flesh, continues to dwell among us.

Abbot Jerome's activities

The Carlton Trail Pro-Life Group sponsored its annual supper at the Uniplex in Humboldt on November 7, 1983. It was very good to see so many come for this supper and the program that followed in support of Pro-Life, and also to learn how generous the Carlton Trail district was in contributing money through the Carriage of Care.

On November 9, Father Werner Renneberg and I went to the United Church at Davidson. After a supper served by the ladies there was an inter-denominational meeting on Pastoral Care, sponsored by CAPE (Canadian Association for Pastoral Education). The principal speaker was Rev. Ron Evans, who is involved fulltime in pastoral care at the University Hospital, Saskatoon. He emphasized the importance of prayer and the spiritual life for those involved in pastoral care in hospitals.

The week after Christmas, December

27 - 31, I was at Glastonbury Abbey, in Hingham, near Boston, for a workshop on The Psalms and Monastic Life. The principal speaker was Father Peter Hammett, of St. Joseph's Abbey, near New Orleans. He spoke of the great role the psalms have had in the prayer life of monks from the beginning of monasticism. He showed also how Benedict used psalms in certain parts of his Rule, especially the Prologue and Chapter 7. He pointed out how often they were used by New Testament writers, by the early Church Fathers, and concentrated on St. Jerome and St. Augustine.

On New Year's Day I was at St. Benedict's Priory, Still River, also not far from Boston. There the Divine Office and the mass (except for the readings) were in Latin, with Gregorian Chant still being used. I enjoyed hearing those familiar melodies and joining in the singing.

Brother Stephen Carthy returned to the abbey for the Christmas holidays on December 17. He returned to continue his studies in history on January 3.



News about the accommodations at St. Peter's, with its good food and quiet, prayerful environment and beautiful natural surroundings, is spread mainly by word of mouth. Calls for bookings have been received recently from as far away as Montreal and Inuvik, N.W.T.

Vince Morrison, former principal of the college, brought a group of specially gifted high school students from Regina for a visit here in early November. They, no doubt, had new impressions of monastic life after their visit here for a day. Rev. Ron Evans, chaplain at the University Hospital, Saskatoon, was another "regular" to return. He brought a group of clergy

here for a day of reflection the first weekend of November, right after the Christian Faith Conference.

The next two weekends in November were devoted to people with marriage on their minds. On the Remembrance Day weekend we had a full house for an engaged encounter. Father Leo Hinz was part of the lead team. The next weekend a group of Mennonite couples came for a marriage enrichment weekend. A group of students from Aldersgate Free Methodist Bible College in Swift Current was here the same weekend.

The last weekend in November featured one of the triennial Oblate Days, with Father Albert Ruetz acting as host. They shared the facilities for part of the time with a group of Lutheran women from Wynyard who came here for a retreat with their pastor before she began her Advent fast in Wynyard with Father Keith Heiberg.

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At the beginning of December and again in mid-January a group of two dozen native men and women from across Saskatchewan came for two 10-day workshops dealing with the problem of alcohol in native communities. It is one of the programs sponsored by the Indian Community College in Saskatoon. Louise Benoit was the very competent and friendly co-ordinator.

The Christmas season saw light use of the guest wing, as the cold weather set in up until Christmas Eve. Some individual visitors at that time included a former junior, Joe McSheffery, who is now working on a reserve in northern Ontario. David Gauthier, who has since joined the monastery as a candidate, was also here several times for a visit.

January got off to a good start with the annual retreat weekend by St. Thomas More students. Their theme this year was ecumenism. Their guest speaker was Father Macbeath Brown, CSB, of the Ecumenical Centre in Montreal. Dialogue was also on the agenda next weekend, as Father Martin Brodner and two lead couples led a half dozen couples in a marriage encounter, Jan. 20 - 22.

Abbey visitation




